

# **KATE BEYNON** *The Shapeshifter's Hour*

### **KATE BEYNON** The Shapeshifter's Hour

The Shapeshifter's Hour explores supernatural themes, guardian figures and magical creatures. The imagery and characters in these recent and new works, expand on the artist's interest in crosscultural stories and mythologies. Featuring a colourful cast of guardian figures developed through recent projects, the exhibition suggests an immersive journey into a world of transformation and mystic ritual.

The figure of the Shapeshifter, who appears in the painting The Shapeshifter's Cloak (2022) is adapted from fox spirits and connections across Asian supernatural tales; her distinctive cloak is inspired by a recent collaborative project with Beynon's son Rali. Other characters include the Blue Shaman Guardian, relating to stories of

ancient female shamanic figures; the Gorgon Guardian, a reimagining of a Medusa-like figure as a fierce protector, and the Lotus Goddess Guardian, a contemporary version of Guanyin, also known as the Goddess of Mercy, who looks out to comfort those in need. Self-portraits (sometimes in shapeshifter form) are interspersed amidst a bevy of confidantes and companion creatures.

Kate Beynon's work often blends personal connections and cross-cultural design influences in a semi-autobiographical and collaborative way. Informed by her family's diverse cultural backgrounds including her Cantonese-Malaysian, Celtic/Welsh and Nordic ancestries, blending with Afro-Caribbean and First Nations Pima-Mexican

ancestries of her husband and son and her stepson's Māori ancestries, Beynon states: "I am grateful to have all these cultural connections in my life; and as a multicoloured, multi-migrant and creative family, we are all grateful to live, work and create on unceded Wurundjeri Kulin Country."

Beynon draws from an eclectic range of pictorial traditions including graphic novels, animation, film, textile design and calligraphy. Female Surrealists Remedios Uranga Varo and Leonora Carrington, contemporaries of Frida Kahlo, are all a strong inspiration, as well as the botanical paintings by 17th Century Qing Dynasty artist Yun Bing, who was renowned for her genre 'bird and flower' paintings.

"I've had a long interest in merging art and fashion, shaped by storytelling, adornment and auspicious motifs. Experimenting with textile painting techniques, sewing and repurposed materials, has led to creating amulets and costume artworks. These

feature botanical and talismanic symbols such as eyes, petals, leaves, skull-spirits, serpentine forms and scales. As a kind of festive ceremonial armour, I see them as imbued with healing and protective gualities... The forms of the new costume cape work are based on lotus motifs as a tribute to the Lotus Goddess figure. Lotus imagery in my work signifies cycles of life, renewal and hope, with lotus seeds said to germinate even after hundreds of years. With the addition of eye motifs, owl or bird-like faces emerge, giving the cape its own presence and spirit ... Much of my work features auspicious imagery and guardian fig-ures as a way of dealing with anxieties and counteracting negative energies in precarious times."

The exhibition also features an intergenerational collaboration; a new animated video with sound created with Kate's husband Michael Pablo and their son, emerging artist and animator Rali Beynon. The animation is based on a series

of supernatural mask spirit characters from a recent collaborative project with Rali; KB X RB – Mask Spirits, held at Sutton Gallery in May 2022. Through experimental watercolour and digital techniques, Spirits Summoning brings these characters to life in a cyclical dream-like space.

The Shapeshifter's Hour continues Beynon's exploration of supernatural tales and characters – reimagining and adapting mythic figures, beings and creatures as a collective of vibrant contemporary guardian figures and companions. Notions of shapeshifting might refer to representing diverse subjectivities-figures who adapt and transform, relating to ideas around fluid cultural identities.

Entering The Shapeshifter's Hour, surrounded by suspended charms and talismans, suggests a time and space to consider other worlds; of transformation and the potential for positive social change, and of 'kindred spirits' coming together.

Kate Beynon is a Hong Kong-born, Naarm/ Melbourne-based multidisciplinary artist. Beynon has a Bachelor of Fine Art (Painting), VCA/University of Melbourne and a PhD in Fine Art, MADA: Monash Art, Design & Architecture, Monash University, and is a Teaching Associate at MADA and VCA. As the current Bank of Melbourne Collingwood Yards Resident (2021/22), Beynon is developing a new Art X Fashion project TudoKB, in connection with The Social Studio. Beynon is a 9-time Archibald finalist; her Collaborative Spirits selfportrait with son Rali and their dog Tudo, was a finalist in the 2021 Archibald, while her 2010 Highly Commended Self-portrait with Guardian Spirits was selected for the Archie 100: A Century of the Archibald Prize (touring until 2024). Winner of the 2016 Geelong Contemporary Art Prize, Beynon's work is included in many collections including NGV, NGA, AGNSW, MCA, AGWA, AGSA. # **COLLABORATIVE ARTIST** MICHAEL PABLO

Michael Pablo McKenzie is a Los-Angelesborn, Naarm-based multi-disciplinary artist, writer and laboratory technician, with a background in music as a MC/lyricist in the mid-late 1990s underground funk and hip hop scene, and Producer of experimental music/culture TV series Flipside. Trained in painting at Art Center, Pasadena, and in Graphic Design in Melbourne, he has worked across mixed media, murals, fashion, screen-printing and film, including multicultural community film projects and youth program workshops.
